Your Committee are sorry to say that some of the Members have been rather backward in paying their Subscriptions, also some of the advertisers in the Gazette, but we hope to see better results next year.

The events of the season were the Opening Run to Bodiam last Good Friday, which was very well attended and a most enjoyable day was spent.

Two Cycle Road Races and two Running Races all of which were well attended, and keen competition took place.

Your Committee arranged a Variety Entertainment last December, on Wednesday the 13th, in the Ore School room, which was very successful and which enabled us to increase our funds to the extent of £1 2s. 8d. as will be seen in the Balance Sheet.

The Club Runs have not been so well attended latterly, but the beginning of the Season was very well attended and the Committee hope to be in a position to give Silver Medals for attendance this coming season.
