Every effort should be made to attract the younger generation to the healthy sport of cycling before they become 'motorised' members of the Hastings and St. Leonards Cycling Club were told at their annual dinner and dance at the Royal Victoria Hotel on Saturday.

Mr Gordon Ely, a former mayor of Faversham and president of the town's cycling club, said that there were a tremendous number of potential cycling club members in the under-16 age group. 'We must go out of our way to attract them to our sport.'

Proposing a toast to the sport of cycling, Mr Ely said that last year alone, seven and a half million bicycles were sold in the United States. This meant that one in 20 of their population bought a new bike.

Many had been purchased by adults for two reasons; they were a handy way of getting around and there was the health advantage.

INCREASE

He went on: 'As far as transport is concerned, we tend to follow America and I can foresee a big increase in the number of cyclists here in the next few years. We must encourage as many as possible to join clubs.'

Unfortunately, too many people got the idea that cyclists rode bikes because they were unable to afford alternative means of transport. This theory, however, was killed by the number of competitors who drove off in cars after events.

This year, Mr Ely continued, the world cycling championships were being held in this country and it was up to cyclists to make the most of the publicity that would be gained from them.

'LOOK SMART'

'We must go out of our way to make people realise that cycling is just as respectable as other forms of sport,' he

told the company and urged riders to turn out for events looking as smart as possible. 'Care must be taken, particularly in road races, to entertain the public and not to annoy them.'

Replying, Mr Dennis Neeves congratulated Mr Ely on the improvements that had been made to the town of Faversham. He described it as one of the smartest towns in the South East.

Mr Neeves welcomed representatives from a wide range of clubs from as far away as Faversham, Woolwich and Catford. Mr Fred Churchill of the Catford club had travelled from Norfolk to attend the function.

FROM NEW ZEALAND

There was a special welcome for Miss Pauline Tyler from Hastings, New Zealand, and among those present was Mr George Jenkins, an England 50-mile champion in 1929 and 1930.

Mr Neeves said that the Hastings club had enjoyed a steady year without hitting the headlines. They had a good nucleus of members who were on the road practically every Sunday.

He made special mention of veteran Jack Southerden, who had emerged sixth in the East Sussex hill climb, a remarkable achievement against much younger competitors.

Mr Neeves concluded by appealing for more members. 'The hills of Hastings seem to put many youngsters off and they get motorised at a very early age,' he added. He felt, however, that the club could face the future with reasonable confidence.
