

PEN PORTRAITS - No. 1.

Bluff, pipe-smoking, forty-nine year old Frederick Roy Humphrey, was one of the founders of the East Sussex Cycling Association in 1946. Since then he has held office continuously in spite of a series of personal scandals beside which Dalton's Budget leak, Shinwell and the Fuel Crisis and the Horatio Bottomley share swindles were mere storms in a teacup. During his decade in power there has been disclosure after shocking disclosure of the malpractices hidden behind the facade of Humphrey, the genial 'Mr. E.S.C.A.': yet at each A.G.M. the delegates, mesmerised by the spell-binding oratory of his annual report, have fallen over themselves to re-elect him secretary, racing secretary, and (folly of follies) treasurer.

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
