

Miss Blackman has been the Secretary of the Sports Day Committee for a number of years. To her family we extend our sympathy.

Quite good support has been forthcoming in the way of entries for the time trials, but the times have been slower in comparison with past years, due to a large extent to the very cold mornings. Competition for the team awards has been very keen, with East Grinstead running Uckfield to within 18 seconds in the 50 miles

earlier this month.

By the time you read these notes the first Road Race to be promoted by the Association will have taken place, with a field of nearly thirty riders. From the entries it appears that the main interest will be in the team race.

Once again, the August Monday Sports Meeting is being held at Rye, with the usual two E.S.C.A. Championships included in the programme of events, namely the 440 and 1,000 yards, besides a full

supporting programme.

It has been found impossible to run the Clubmans Touring Competition on the date approved at the last Committee Meeting, due to the lack of marshals on that date owing to holidays. It will now be held on Sunday, 14th September, starting from Magham Down at 11 a.m.

A change of venue for the Annual Luncheon on November 30th has been agreed. It will now take place at the Hayworthe Hotel, Haywards Heath, after being held at Hastings for quite a number of years.

In conclusion, I would appeal to all clubs to let be have the names of persons who are available to assist with the marshalling and feeding for the Association 12 hours early in August.

## UCKFIELD AND DISTRICT CYCLING CLUB.

The last time I "did the stuff for BONK" was exactly one day before the start of the racing season, and here we are with Whitsun on top of us (gone by the time you read this). Despite rain and cold, things got off to a flying start, with Simon winning the 10, and next week, with sunny weather, but still cold enough for the Prof' fur collar, found Spindle joining Grand-dads Pearson and Griffiths for a two-minute team win in the Hardriders. On the way home that evening Reg found a hole in the road which bent his bike (and dial) more than somewhat, so the medium gear found him well below par, apart from missing the Caterham dinner at which he was to have been guest of honour. Ced. and Griff had a new third man in the M.G., Tony pushing Spin out, while the same day the Newick contingent made up their own private team for the "Counties" event. The first Sussex 25 - marred by wind and cold - Griff took second place and led the team to their third successive win, while Simon took first handicap in the longmarkers. Spin was a convincing winner of the 25 championship, with Roy making a welcome return and Ced. turning in a 1-8 for his first attempt on a barrow. Meanwhile John had his first outing with third place in the Solent 25 and Griff was down to a short "4" in the same event. Easter week-end was chiefly remarkable for the number of non-starters in the Vectis 25, but we are assured that a "good time was had by all". Griff and Horace sorted out the London Group "Vets" event, and John was way ahead of the field in the first unrestricted gear E.S.C.A. 25, with Spin second and Cedric weighing in for a nine-minute team lead. The next week the "terrible twins" (vide "Cycle Sport") repeated their success in the V.T.T.A. Surrey and Sussex Group 25, while Ced took to the hills only to puncture. The individual championship 25 provided plenty of excitement, with Gerry Atterbury - a worthy champion - successfully defending his title against a very strong challenge from John and Dave, and a dozen riders inside a "six". Griff as usual was well up, and Reg and Bob Hedger also figured in the awards list. The E.S.C.A. 50 was a clear win for Reg by nearly three minutes on a hard day which sorted out quite a few people, the team result, with Cedric punctured and out of the running, was a near thing, in spite of Spin's improvement, but Os weighed in with a first-time 2-19 to give us an 18-second margin, while Tony's and Pete's first 50's on a difficult day were also very creditable.

With several riders of about the same potential it was quite a difficult job to decide on who should represent the club in the Team Championship, and I must say those who had to stand down rose to the occasion nobly, either in the "B" team, marshalling, or providing





#### EAST SUSSEX ROAD SAFETY COUNCIL

County Road Safety Headquarters, Malling House, Lewes. 27th May, 1958.

Dear Sir,

A special summer campaign directed to the safety of cyclists and motor-cyclists is being planned by the Ministry of Transport on a national basis for the period commencing 16th June till the end of September.

The object of the campaign 'Cycling and Motor Cycling in Safety' is to reduce accidents to cyclists and motor cyclists who on account of their vulnerability sustain a comparatively high casualty rate, and the campaign will in fact constitute an appeal to all read users to join in this special effort. In the case of cyclists, over 61,000 were injured and some 780 killed in Great Britain during 1957.

I feel confident that your Club will wish to support the campaign, and having in mind the considerable experience in cycling which members of the Club will undoubtedly have aquired, my Council would welcome any suggestions which you or members would put forward as to the best means of making the campaign effective.

It is suggested for instance that should your Club be arranging trials or events during the summer months the inclusion of items directly related to road safety based on the Highway Code might be considered.

For your information special propaganda material for the campaign is on order. Samples of this can be sent to you when available.

# ST. MARY'S CHURCH, NORTHIAM (Concl.) by W. Baker.

If we visit the South Aisle first we will notice that the Caps and Bases of the arcade are not so refined as those of the North Arcade, and both show a style common in the early and late 13th Century respectively. It is only when examining the windows that we come to the true age of the aisles as those in the South Aisle are 14th Century Decorated, and those in the North Aisle Early 15th Century Perpendicular, the workmanship of each being far more refined than that shown in the arcades. The explanation is probably this. The Caps and Bases were worked by local masons on the site to the best of their ability and knowledge, which in those days could earily be fifty to one hundred years out of date, whereas the windows were purchased from London or one of the other great centres where they were constructed by masons who were conversant with the latest fashions and methods. These windows would have been transported to Northiam in sections (no easy matter in those days) and re-erected on the site, usually under the supervision of a master mason from the centre. Thus it is fairly safe to say that the South Aisle, in spite of the 13th Century appearance of the arcades. was constructed about 1330 and the North Aisle about eighty years later.

About the end of the 15th Century or early in the 16th the Tower was raised and the Great Buttress at the Western angle built, the whole being capped by the stone spite mentioned earlier. Also

about this time it appears likely that the West Window was inserted and the Norman doorway taken down and replaced by the Present one. Incidentally the spire was raised a further ten feet in 1860. From the 15th Century St. Mary's was allowed to remain undisturbed until the hands of the 'restorers' were laid on it in 1837. They, with their customary zeal, proceeded to rebuild the chancel and it's adjoining aisles, and as if not satisfied went on to strip the tiles from the roof and replace them with slates. Northiam was perhaps fortunate in only losing it's East End: in other parts of the county the usual method of restoration was a complete rebuilding of the church in Victorian Gothic style, leaving little of the original building.

In this brief description I have traced the building of the church from Norman to more recent times; it now only remains to run briefly over some of the other features which can be seen, including the Frewin Mausoleum built in 1845 by Smirke, who was also responsible for the restoration mentioned earlier. The chancel contains some fine brasses, the oldest being the Beauford Brass, a memorial to Sir Robert Beauford, Rector of Northiam during the reign of Henry VII, and shows the Rector in Mass Vestments. There are also other brasses dating from the 16th Century. The only old stained glass now in the church can be found in the North Aisle. The oak panelling, altar table and rails were presented by Thankfull Frewen in 1638, and it is interesting to note that another member of the same family, Accepted Frewin, was first Archbishop of York after the Restoration in 1660.

#### EAST GRINSTEAD C.C.

With the Press date hard upon me a hurried search is being made backs of envelopes, start cards or anything that will reveal who did what and where in the racing sphere. Perhaps it's best that not every performance was recorded or this report would read like Bradshaw's timetable; however, enough to say that the standard of riding throughout the club has been pretty high in spite of, or perhaps because of, the awful opening to the season.

Delving back into the distant past, it appears that Gordon Leney was our fastest man in the Hardriders '12' with a 37 minute ride, and this was succeeded by the Association Medium Gear '25' when Don got fourth place with a '7'. Our Club event on March 30th saw another victory for Don with 1-5-27, followed by Gordon and Bill. And then we came to Easter, which if I remember was a trifle chilly. Micky rode up at the Good Friday meeting at Herne Hill and although reaching the heights of being mentioned by the B.B.C. commentator, was unplaced in his events. Rumour had it that they had snow ploughs out on G.9 on Easter Day for the Fountain '25', which, whether one had a spinnacker or not, was 'ARD. Micky was placed fourth with 1-5-34 followed by Don, Ray and Bill.

April 20th found various members competing in three different events. As mentioned in the last edition, some of the boys have gone B.L.R.C. and on this day made their essay at the bunched game in the Newick Road Race. Gordon was best with 24th place, though the lessons learned were invaluable, for subsequent events, including the value of food. Don and Bill competed in the Bec '25', in which Don clocked a 1-3. Crow was sole representative of the club in the Southborough Wheelers Hilly '42' which lived up to it's name with 3,300 feet of climbing. He finished seventh behind Dave Patten's fantastic winning ride. Next year I hope the organisers will advertise with the slogan: "As good a three bob's worth of suffering as you'll get anywhere". Incidentally, the whole organisation was first-class, and it is a pity that so few ESCA members took part. The Association '50' was one of our best days for some time, when we bagged three of the six awards. Don was placed at last with 2-13-53, while Crow and Gordon took 1st and 2nd handicap prizes respectively. It was in this event that Crow put up his personal best time of 2-15-53; maybe it has something to do with the fact that one just CAN'T bowl down to an event in an M.G. sports car and then do a bad time. The team race was in doubt until near the end of the event, when Uckfield snatched it from us by 18 seconds. Be warned, you Farmers, we'll have you yet! The following week

Don, Bill and Gordon rode in the Bournemouth Arrow '25', where Don did 1-3-52, followed by Gordon with a personal best 1-4. Which just about brings us up to date with the Catford '50', where Don did a 2-10, the fastest ride by a club member this year. The mass-start boys rode in the Battle Circuit road race in which Micky came 9th and Gordon 15th.
