

EDITORIAL

No news is Good News. So goes the old saying; and if it be true then the Association's prospects for 1959 are good. No drastic changes resulted from the recent A.G.M.: in fact, after hearing the Secretary report a successful year both in sport and in social activity, coupled with an improved financial position, the delegates voted for 'The mixture as before'. There were, of course, small changes. The endless search went on for a version of _.52 that is fast, has plenty of room at the finish and has reasonable shelter for the officials, and we think that the suggested alteration to be tried next season is a good one. also welcome the conversion of one '25' and one '50' into Short and Longmarkers' events. This is just the incentive needed by slower riders who have been competing too long to have much hope of a handicap prize. On the official side everyone can continue to enjoy the warm feeling of security engendered by the knowledge that Roy Humphrey is able and willing to be the dynamo of East Sussex cycling. This is a happy state of affairs, though we feel that it would be no bad thing if Roy were to leave the district for a year or more, so that the Association would be forced to stand, as it were, on it's own feet. Having been entrusted with the social side for another year, we promise to do our humble best; and the troublesome position of Press Secretary has now been filled (most satisfactorily, we think) by Dave Patten, whose contribution to club life does not end at riding a bicycle fast. Yes, no news looks like being good news, and given the same co-operation and enthusiasm by member clubs, should make 1959 another happy year in the history of this most friendly and happy organisation - the East Sussex Cycling Association.

Once again we are at the end of another year in the history of the Association, a year in which we can safely say we have consolidated the Association. In the racing sphere we have seen very keen competition even though records have not been broken. In the Best-All-Rounder Competitions interest lasted right up to the last event of the season, P. Crowsley and B. Honess being the eventual winners.

Members of our affiliated clubs have given very good accounts of themselves in Open Competition, the most notable being J. Dutson, Uckfield & District C.C., at 25, 50 and 100 miles, and M. Robinson & D. Patten for their fine rides at the end of the season Hill Climbs.

Our Annual Prize Presentation I think we can say was one of the best ever despite all the difficulties we had to overcome at the last moment. I think an explanation of the reason for the change of venue will not be out of place here. Terms were agreed by our Social Secretary earlier in the year with the Hayworthe Hotel for the Luncheon on November 30th, and all arrangements were made to hold it there, and then out of the blue a few weeks before the date they informed us that they would have to make a 10% surcharge and worse still they were not prepared to get an extension of licence. In the circumstances we had no alternative but to make other arrangements, and we are most grateful to the management of the Chatsworth Hotel, Hastings, for once again accommodating us at such short notice.

The financial position is a little brighter than it was 12 months ago, and the clubs are to be congratulated on the way they have sold tickets for the recent draw, the result being far in excess of what we had expected. Also the response to the appeal for loans to purchase a new duplicator has been very gratifying, donations and loans have more than covered the cost. We are now in possession of the duplicator, and it is a big improvement on our old one.

Looking forward to next year, a full programme of time trials have been arranged, basically the same as this year. Our 25 miles events will be run on a new course which, subject to A.G.M. and R.T.T.C. approval, will start north of Boship Roundabout on A267, and finish near the starting point. It is hoped that the Clubmans Touring Competition will also be run and receive a bumper entry.

In conclusion, I would like to take this opportunity of thanking you all for your help during 1958, and to wish you all the season's greetings and pleasant riding during 1959.



Greetings, fellow cyclists - our racing boys are keenly looking forward to the coming season, but whether it be the racing or social seasons I'm not quite sure. Well, anyway, let's recap on the closing events of the racing season.

On Aug. 31st as you know, the Association '50' was held. The conditions, though dry for a change, were far from easy, but we managed to gain the team award with Ken Stevens returning 2-13-57, followed closely by Brian Cornwall with 2-14-10. An interesting tussle for the honour of third man in the team took place between keen rivals Quentin Rance and Johnny Mayes, and it was Quentin's 2-16-50 (his fastest so far) which gained him this position. The margin in this personal battle was narrow, however, for John came in only four seconds slower than his rival, beating his previous best by nearly three minutes. On Sept. 21st four of the racing men went to the west in search of a last-minute improvement in the fast Bognor Regis C.C. '25'. On this occasion, however, the exposed nature of the course proved rather a drawback, as wind and rain slowed almost all the riders. Ken made a time of 1-2-45, failing to get out of his '2' rut, Johnny Mayes recorded 1-4-7 (his second fastest ever), and 'Yaky' returned to the timekeeper in 1-5-20, just bearing Quentin with 1-5-40. At one time the Rovers were challenging for second place in the team competition, but fast times by late finishers put paid to our hopes in that direction.

On Oct. 5th we saw the re-introduction of the club hill-climb, which is held on Sanatorium Hill, East Dean. Ken Stevens showed that by learning a hill's peculiarities through daily riding can pay off, by winning the event. He reached the top in 3 mins. 1.8 secs. Next man up 10 secs. behind was Ken Miller, riding gears, and making a welcome reappearance to the 'battle-field'. Third place went to 'Whippet' Manser, who promptly fell off at the top and vowed never to ride another hill-climb. The club B.A.R. Trophy for 1958 has been won by Brian Cornwall, the Stanley Cup for the fastest '25' by Denzil de Grey with a time of 1-0-28. Colin Brook, a new member, has won the novices cup. On October 19th we had our annual run to the Catford Hill Climb, where we were privileged to see a grand performance put up by Dave Patten, in coming second in this classic event. For the third year running the boys started on a run to that elusive place 'Wheelbarrow Town', near Maidstone. This time we were successful in reaching our target, though the run was marred by an unfortunate incident caused by a careless motorist, resulting in Dave Dumbar parting with his 'iron' in an unaccustomed manner, making the machine

very unrideable, while Stan and his cycle of nine lives escaped with just one bent crank.

Nan's ghost. One of the interesting characters of Sussex was Jack Fuller. He was a rather eccentric man who lived in the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, and was known as a 'Folly' builder. He is responsible for five of these 'follies'. They are situated in the part of Sussex a few miles north-west of Battle. One is an obelisk on Brightling Down known as 'Brightling Needle'. Another is the 'Sugar Loaf' at Dallington which he built because of a boast that he could see Dallington church spire from his window. He found he could not and ordered the 'spire' to be built so that it just appeared above the trees. It is said that a man once spent a year inside the Sugar Loaf without ever coming out, cutting his nails or his hair, or washing, for a wager. Fuller also built the observatories, and his tomb is yet another 'folly'. He was the M.P. for Sussex and had a great deal of money with which he was very generous. He bought Bodiam Castle to stop it going to ruin. His tomb is a huge pyramid in Brightling churchyard which dominates all the other graves. He is said to be sitting inside in full evening dress before a roast chicken and a bottle of claret.

How many people in Sussex know what a 'groumet' is? Very few, I expect. It is one of the old Sussex crafts. They used to be made at Harting, a little village near Chichester. For the first few years of the last war the Royal Navy was almost dependent on the few cottagers who made grommets. These are small pieces of tape twisted round tiny steel cylinders, and they are a kind of washer. The condensers of liners are made up of hundreds of tubes. On each tube fits a grommet which allows for the expansion and contraction of the tube and also prevents salt water from getting into the boiler. The tape is stitched tightly round the cylinder in a special way, and is then taken off. They used to make three to four hundred a day, but nowadays few vessels are dependent on grommets for a machine-made product is said to be more efficient.

Sussex has many other interesting tales, crafts and people, but I think that these are some of the most intriguing.

SOUTHBOROUGH NEWS.

With the last Quarter now crossing the photo finish and with everything over bar the arm lifting, a backward glance at the '58 racing scene may be of interest. The B.A.R. table shows ten riders having complete sets of figures, exceeding last year's 'high' of seven. Ron Hayward's winning average speed was a club record and now gives him premier place for the fifth time, the last four times in succession, Jack Daniel intervening in 1953 and 1954 to isolate Ron's 1952 win. Apart from Ron's performance this year and with the exception of Les Hayman's 4-29-16 '100', club members performances on time have been of a low order. Nevertheless the competition has paradoxically been the keenest ever with thirty-four riders having competed to a record total of more than 13,000 miles of completed events. The K.C.A. '100' saw eleven riders take part and all

complete the distance, with Pete Cooke gaining second handicap award. Others to win Association awards were Phil Hennessey (1st hcap. in ESCA '50'), Les Hayman (third in KCA '12' with almost an 'evens' ride), team prize in the Kent NCU hillclimb on Boxley (Alan Bathurst, Dick Robbins and Phil Hennessey obliging); and Dawn Hayward's 1st h'cap. in the Oldbury '12' from 6 with an actual 205 miles. Club events have been supported even more than last year's record, with the Racing Secretary having an easy task to find marshals. Here for the record are the Southborough B.A.R. tables:-
