

E.S.C.A. events were well supported but other Association and Open events were showing again less support. Southborough riders have had their fair share of successes in E.S.C.A. events whilst competition has been keen in Club events. There were again 9 finishers in the Club B.A.R. and six in the Junior B.A.R. (15 yrs. - 18 yrs.), five of whom were having their first season's racing. Carol and Dawn rode some keen tussles. Carol in her first season has some consistent rides to her credit whilst Dawn not appearing on the scene until late in the season was improving with every ride with the season's end coming too soon for her.

Late season events went as follows :-

Crow followed up his 237 mile win in the ESCA 12 with 233 miles in the KCA event a fortnight later for 8th place from a field of 80 riders. The Club 50 record was lowered in the ESCA 50 by Crow, Ted and Brian, 2.9.53, 2.14.6. (personal best by more than 6 mins.) and 2.15.53. respectively. Crow followed up with a 4.30.41. for 2nd handicap in the Leamington 100 in the first week in September. This was a personal best. George Cheesman was the Club's only other rider in this event, his time being just inside evens. The Club 30 also on this day saw a close finish between Arthur Parks, Roy Pyne who started favourite in the absence of Ron, and Clive Orchard. The result was Arthur, Roy, Clive 1.20.48., 1.21.8., and 1.21.41. respectively. The next week September 11th saw Crow again in top gear with a win in the ESCA 25 in 1.3.42. by 20 secs. from Tunbridge Wells' Ian Jenner. Ron and George Cheesman rode the Middlesex 12 on this date but both were below form recording 226 and 216 miles respectively. On September 18th Ron, Ted and Brian tackled the Medway 100 in tough finishing conditions, with the last 25 miles into a headwind. There was little to choose between our 3 riders on paper at the start of the event, but whilst Ron and Brian kept true to form with 4.47. 2. (11th place) and 4.52.30. respectively, Ted was struggling a few seconds outside evens. Had he been on form there would have been a team prize waiting! From the Crow scandal column I hear that a Canterbury C.C. fast girl taught Ted the quick slow SLOW, S L O W, FULL STOP, the evening before! On the same morning the Club September 25 was run off with a win and personal best for Giles Job in 1.5.47., followed by Clive Orchard in 1.6.14. and Arthur Parks 1.6.36. On the last week-end of September Ron and Arthur tackled the Redhill 50 in misty conditions. Times: Ron 2.15.16, Arthur 2.17.53. Brian and Ted rode in the Epsom Tandem 30 but surprisingly never showed in 1.14.55 to the winning 1.5.15. The final club event on the flat - The Hay and Corn Stakes on October 2nd attracted a field of 18 with Ron the winner in 1.4.56., with a close finish for minor honours contested by Clive, Brian and Arthur, who finished in that order with 1.5.55,

1.6.4. and 1.6.16. Our riders were most successful in the E.S.C.A. Hill Climb, running our 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th. Mick Armitage (1.50) Ron (1.52) Brian (1.53) Giles (1.55), the first 3 taking the team. It was Mick versus Ron in the Catford, with Ron reversing the placings this time to the tune of 2.19 to 2.23. But on the Club Climb on Carters Hill, Underriver, it was Mick in the final 50 yards of the 700 yards of 1 in 7 average who clinched the event and the championship (run over the 3 hills of ESCA, Catford and Club). Times Mick 1.35 4/5, Ron 1 36 4/5 and a fine third place ride by fifteen years old Barry Gilbert (who rides by permission of Fred Crumb) of 1 47 3/5. There were 8 riders. Mick won the 3 hills championship by the whisker of 1 1/5 seconds from Ron.

With Club membership standing at the 70 mark events should again follow the pattern of 1960, and it is hoped to improve on the numbers riding in Open Events. The Club Open Hilly 42 on the same course will be run for the 4th year on April 16th, when again no effort will be spared to make this event again a first-class promotion.

Next season you will be hearing from "Tug of the North", who will be sure to give his readers complete, comprehensive coverage of every aspect of Southborough racing. My 3 years with "The Bonk" (imagine that !) have been most enjoyable. The season's greetings to you all and much twiddling, pedalling and stomping in the NEW YEAR.

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CYCLING & SEX

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Part I. Introduction and Racing.
