

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

EDITORIAL

As the Association's racing season nears it's close, my first task is to offer congratulations to John Dutson, who said at the outset that he was aiming to make his presidential year a memorable one, competitively speaking; and has achieved his ambition with a string of wins and placings. It has hardly been a vintage year otherwise, with the weather being on the whole poor, and the number of entries not showing much improvement. The decision to make the 100 an open was the right one, even if outside riders did not exactly fall over themselves to compete in East Sussex. The Open 25 too showed that G833 is not a sought-after course, a fact which I find rather puzzling because, granted that our course is not the greatest ever, surely it is not as bad as all that . Perhaps it is because there are no 'gift' fast rides on the Dicker. The August 50 continues to be so poorly supported that one begins to ponder on the advisibility of having a close season during the eighth month. Finally I feel that we must be very careful in planning our dates for 1972, as this season there seem to have been more clashes than before with Kent C.A. events; and with two of our clubs also members of the latter association and wishing to support it's events, this is quite an important factor. There is obviously a fair amount of thinking to be done before October 11th, and the meeting on that date should not be lacking in interest.

## Management Committee Meeting \_\_ August 15th

The meeting was held at Hellingly, with the President taking the chair as both the Chairman and Vice-Chairman were unable to be present. Apologies were recieved from the latter two officials, also from the Magazine Editor. With reference to the troubles over the ten mile course, it was reported that a London South official had been down to have a look; and it was decided to set up a sub-committee to go thoroughly into the 10 and other local courses. The Marsh course was ruled out. Mr Humphrey said that the engraving of the outstanding 1970 awards was now being done and they should be ready soon. He reported that the Birmingham Medal Company had informed him that they were not prepared to deal with the Association direct. It was stated that the complaint about alleged company riding in the 100 had been referred to the RTTC for investigation. There was also a complaint from the Hastings club that they had only had four days notice about providing marshals for this event; and the promoting club (Lewes Wanderers) promised to look into this. It was pointed out that the final Yellow Pages criterium was now going to be staged at Brighton on October 3rd, the same day as the Association's touring competition: it was therefore decided to move the Touring Competition to Vovember 21st. The organiser accepted with thanks Stan and Joan Shirley's offer to look after the catering. The meeting decided that the venue for the A.G.M. and Party on November 28th will be Hellingly Hall ; and all member clubs are asked to contribute draw prizes. There was a suggestion that the Association should purchase a thermal tea-urn in order to overcome the problem of providing refreshments on the present 25 course. The Secretary was asked to make enquiries as to the cost of such a utensil.

## SOUTHBOROUGH AND DISTRICT WHEELERS

Having followed the Editor's advice not to wait in traffic jams or get drunk, I used a fair portion of a drizzly Bank Holiday catching up on letter writing, and now here is BONK overdue and inspiration seems conspicuous by it's absence. Perhaps the Editor, noting my mean streak of writing on the backs of old letters, may find the fronts more interesting reading than this report. (Yes, there is plenty of good stuff; see Here and There for details. Ed.)

A Southboro' 'nutshell' report should read ; 1971 has seen a far higher standard of time-trialling with several sub-hour rides. Paul Woodman has been tops at short distances and Malc Withers has a large lead at the B.A.R. distances. While no speed records have been broken, the entries in eyents have been larger, including a record number of successful come-backs. Now for the news in all it's gruesome detail. Main interest has centred on the 25 mile championship with Roy Harrison's third place in the Clarence Whs. event in 58-15 setting the pace. Then came our first evening 25 which was blessed with a fine evening. Those Escabods who have ridden the Q131 will know that once you have left the Horsemonden to Yalding 'arterial' there are some tricky little twisty lanes round the hop fields which ontthis occasion had been re-surfaced in the approved fashion of a half pint of tar to half a hundred weight of grit ! Thus the latter part of the event resembled a speedway final at Arlington ! Out from the gravel pit emerged Paul Woodman with a fantastic 1-0-1 . A fortnight later Malc Withers won the club 25 with 1-0-57, putting it over Paul and Roy ; and three days later Roy clocked 59-21 in the Thanet to show it was no fluke, and Malc had got down to 1-0-32. Came the Bon Amis Saturday evening event on the Bath Road, and with the needle really on, Paul pulled out all the stops to win with 58-5 to Malc's 1-0-35; and this was followd by a 12th in the National Junior Champ. with 58-41 to lead both the club's junior and senior 10 mile champs. the 25 champs. and the junior B.A.R. As may be gathered, these three gents have dominated the club events and have set the trend for 'away' racing on the E,F and H courses. Ron Hayward spends most week ends tramping up and down the Bath Road, and with a 1-2 and a 2-10 to his credit shouldn't complain (but does). His journey to York for the National Championship 100 earnt him a puncture and a 4-46. Such is the amount of racing that only highlights can be touched on. Southboro' repeated thir 1970 treatment of the San Fairy Ann by walloping them by nine minutes in the inter-club 25 and by a smaller margin in the 10. Malc's Gravels took him to Norwich to visit our 'district' member Richard Cave, and with brother Geoff to a 1st and 31d handicap win in the Norwich 25. Personal bests of 2-3 in the Belle

Vue and a 4-29 in the K.C.A. gave him a commanding three-distance B.A.R. lead. Further down the line we watched the Pete Baker comeback wtory with his 1-6 and 2-18, while George Cheesman finds his present rides are approaching those of his heyday. Crow's attempts to improve his 'Best of the last three seasons' have been narrowly thwarted, by five seconds for the 25 and two seconds for the 50. Dawn'w 28-35 on the Polhill course got to within fifteen seconds of her personal best. The new slim-line Bathurst (racing type) has been pounding the tarmac several times a week and is now down to 1-12-58 just behind Roy's brother Adriah but leading Pete Wall who gave up drinking and made his wife pregnant in order to get down to a '15'. The Loyland v Dunford saga is being closely fought with just eight seconds separating them. in their 3 x 25 mile rides until Spider produced a 1-8-0. Bryan is now off on holiday to brood on this. The plagues of Jacko still persist, with standard troubles like back ache and crashes, but also mixed with the unusual like a loose saddle clip (DNF by Zeus !), and his bike falling off a roof rack. However there was a 'personal' of 1-5-12 before retiring for the season along with Robin Howard. The bogy event was the K.C.A. 12 hours, and with eight possible finishers in the Senior B.A.R. and a fine day, it looked all set for a fine battle in Les Hayman's promotion. Malc W. stormed round with the club record within his grasp ; but by six hours Jacko's back trouble was too manifest to continue and Ron buokled his rear wheel and retired. (As the writer has been racing this season with a cracked rim, maybe he should take note. ) The final hours on the wetern end of the course found many changes of fortune, most of them adverse. Graham Orchard and Bryan loft the scene here, while Malc sold out with two hours left and finished with 228 miles. This left George and Geoff who had been doing steady rides to tot up 2102 and 217, and Crow, who found his 'fast in the final half' form again to produce his best for six years with 226 miles. Mention of Esca rides has been left till last as club support, mainly due to 'away' racing and concentrating on the Kent B.A.R., has been very poor. The June 50 (what perfect weather ! ) saw Paul making his debut at the distance with 2-13-41. Crow clocked 2-15-5 and here I must mention the fine manners which the Brighton Mitre riders display. When Keith Chandler caught me I commented that it was hardly the done thing to pass vice-presidents, at which he dropped back and finished some minutes down. Very decent of him, I thought. It's rather hard to write about the 100 with the official inquiry pending, but it was pleasing to see a small increase in the number of entries thanks largely to the Wigmora CC, and seeing another win for our rapid

president. Congrats also to Robin Johnson for his second place after the Catford 24 hrs. ride the week previous; and to the CTC for handing up such excellent feeds. I'll lend Ron Ewart a feeding bettle for next year's event; he also berrowed my racing cap this time and with that heat he needed it! The Whitsun National Champienship 25 promoted by Lou for the South-East D.C. caused the end of our Isle of Wight jaunt after 22 years. Lou originally wanted 96 helpers but "got by" with 80 from fifteen clubs; makes one wonder if the riders were able to see much of the course (Maybe you're not supposed to if you really race). Anyway, Pete Baker held the watch and it all went off OK with the rain just holding off.

Cycling holidays seem almost a thing of the past; only Robin did a fortnights 'All-England' (or some of it) tour. I joined him on the Lancs section where we called on Geoff Hayman and sundry friends. The Ed. will add if I don't, that my friends live in Lancs as its a long way from Edenbridge. The Peacheys have just come back from an unusual holiday in Iceland, while the Bakers have departed for the Alps and Male is viewing the World Championships. Regrettably the club-run side seems to have dropped away, such is the intensity of the racing activity now. Runs to tea have received varying support, but with a few notable exceptions the younger riders are seldem seen apart from club night and evening events. We hope that as the autumn draws on we shall get the runsgoing properly again, with maybe a few inter-club teas and hostelling week-ends. One facet of cycling that may emerge to cater for those without racing pretensions is cycle orienteering. Keith Butler, who spoke at the last Association Luncheon, is the moving spirit behind it; and from what I learn this could do much to bring some fun back into the game (ask Val Baxendine). Those of you who wish to get run in for the Esca tourist comp. on November 21st are invited to ride the Southborough open event on November 14th. We also have our open 100 in 7 or 8 on October 24th. Better start learning how to breathe hydrogen again - the hill-climbs are nearly here!

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Looking back on the summer's events, the June 50 had what was really the morning of the season, with warm supshine and a nice north-wester erly drift to help the riders back from the last turn. As briefly reported in the Summer issue, Jon Dutson made Association history by being the first President to win an event; this in spite of a stripped sprocket depriving him of his favourite 84 inch ratio for much of the distance. The 100 also had a fine morning, and the Open format brought in a Wigmore team and two other riders to add to the baker's dozen of local competitors. The President was again in good form and won by nearly 8 minutes. Unfortunately the event was to some extent marred by an allegation of company riding against certain riders. The August 50 had it's usual rather low entry and a so-so morning. J.R.D. did almost a repeat of his June ride, but had to be content with second place behind the Sebford Express, who was riding on home ground for a change. The Open 25 had a rather disappointing entry of fifty riders, including most of the local stalwarts. Apart from some fog patches the morning was good, and Cliff Sharp managed an underOthe-hour ride to keep the trohy in East Sussex, with East Surrey's P. Humphrey second and Mr Predident third. There was only one lady competitor, a new name on the scene in Miss H. Nickless of Central Sussex. As a result of the above events, Eastbourne Rovers now lead in the points league table by a small margin from Central Sussex, with Brighton Mitre lying third.

Having waited too long for a frisky postcard from Hastings, and having surprisingly recieved one from the Great White Chief, about another matter, your scribe feels he'd better get something down before he gets blown up (and thus shares the fate of many a 'dolly'). His remarks last time about the smiling sun were promptly followed by what was surely the worst June on record ; so in future he'd better keep his trap shut andleave the forecasting to people with pet corns.! The 'January in June' was too much for Amparo, who took off for Spain to find some sun : the next day the weather turned and we had a great July ! Despite the rain and murk there was a good turnout for the club 30 which saw a very good 1-19-49 from Steve Myatt who also took the handicap. Sacond man Whittington did a '21' and Burbery a '23', with Kilby and Gander on '25's, and Andrew Myatt a '30' after very little training. In the Esca (and club) 50 Whittington's '17' beat Burbery by 22 minutes and Steve Myatt by no less than almost 4 mins. to shake evryone. Kilby did a '22' and the Copper a '30' dead, while Savage's '24' was enough to poach the handicap. The Rovers 25 had Whittington on 1-8-2 and the others slipping back to unprintable times; although a mention must be made of the pain-racked 1-19 recorded by an under-trained and over-weight Agg. Out trio in the Esca 100 had a chance of the team award but couldn't clobber the Central boys, although Whittington's 4-51 was a good effort in his first shot at the distance. In the SCA (and club) 100 Dick only just held off Burbery, but both slipped to 5-11s - it was that sort of morning. Steve Myatt went to town with 1-6-33 and handicap in the second club 25, while surprise second man was Burbery, who turned in a 1-7-48 and relegated Dick to an unacustomed third place nearly a minute slower. Hills appeared 'out of the blue' and was only twelve seconds slower than Dick on what was quite a good morning. Steve took the evening 10 series with some very good rides on our bumpy course; and the handicap went to Tony Andrews, whose riding in all events was a model of consistency, never varying by more than a few seconds from the third event onwards. Trevor Wright's absence has been due to a damaged knee through coming off in training a la Simon. Dick sampled his first taste of road racing in our Evening Criterium series, and hung on to finish ninth. The second event had the only wet evening in the series to date, but this affected the overall result as many were DNS. Congratulations to the Grinstead's Bob Beatty who won well and also to Adrian Jones who was runner-up, and Mick Adams and Bob Smith (good to see Bob back), who tied for third place. Everyone seemed satisfied with our standard of promotion in the Association 100, worthily won by evergreen Jon Dutson, with Robin Johnson second

and Ron Rogers third. The overall result is still provisional pending investigation, although the weather did it's best to help things along as last year.

We're glad to see George Rickards back in circulation again, and we hope that Eric Bonner has now recovered from the nasty pileup in the third criterium event. Your scribe, still aching but now encased in a corset (all right, pack up the wolf whistles), has a companion in distress in Pete Hayes of Crawley, who also has had a hard time of it lately. We'd be requesting special prayers if the ESCA was a religious body - not the "if". The turn marshal in the sixth 10 rubbed his eyes as he beheld what seemed to be a small airship approaching. As it got nearer he recognised the over-generous proportions of Agg having his first racing fling of the season and bawling "I've only been caught by one --- so far! " His 31-52 left plent; of room for improvement ! Your scribe says "sorry" to all those who have suggested that he should be charged with aiding and abetting a public mischief, compounding a felony etc., but pleads mitigating circumstances, as will be found elsewhere. His error was in forgetting to swear Cliff Sharp to secrecy! During the period of the Sharpsmobile's incapacity, Cliff and Dick were conveyed to the Bath Road for the Bon Amis 50 in the Bomb 441. Ron Ewart has been having a consistent season with 4-55-12 in the Association 100 and 2-22-36 in atrocious conditions in the Colchester Vets' 50. Ron Rogers has produced two sizzling '58s' to date.
