### BRIGHTON MITRE C.C. Was larger of the same and the same a

Owing to serious attacks of sloth and amnesia, Mitre notes have been absent from the last two issues, so I will have to make this a review of the season. Overall it has been a very successful one for the Mitre, although our representation in ESC/ events has not been as strong as we would have liked owing, as mentioned before the season started, to our juniors and schoolboys being more interested in bunch racing, and our Vets preferring VTT/ events on some occasions.

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High spot of the season was, of course, Richard Smith's 1st in the Fursuit and 2nd in the Sprint at the National Championships at Leicester. We actually had three representatives there, Richard, Alan Goodson and 'Jumbo' Oxborrow, none of whom had ever ridden a 'real' track before. They travelled up over the previous weekend, got to the track on the Monday and spent the day falling down the bankings. By the opening events on the Tuesday they had got the hang of things. Alan and Jumbo did not get beyond the 2nd round of the sprint, but were certainly not disgraced. Richard in his first attempt at sprinting reached the final, being beaten by Peter Malyon, who had been training at Herne Hill with the London sprinters.

The Fursuit saw Richard fastest timetrialist, with Alan just failing to qualify with ninth fastest time, in spite of not being given the bell with a lap to go, but he made some amends by cleaning up a Consolation

Points race, winning most of the laps.

Seeing in Cycling that Richard had qualified for the semi-final, we quickly loaded up the car and set off for Leicester, arriving at the Track almost half an hour before the meeting. The first person we met as we turned into the Track was Tony Yorke, who had somehow found his way to Leicester from a holiday in the New Forest. Then Richard got up to ride the final we martiallid oursupporters along the front of the stand and by much bellowing managed to get everyone shouting. I think Richard got more support from the crowd than any other of the five finals that night, except the tandem, which was a classic in itself.

Back now to the local scene; The return of the Sussex CA Championships to the traditional course saw a better entry than of late. In the events, an absent Adrian Morris and Alan Limbrey suffering from a pile up left your scribe as 4th Counter, and suffering from flu to boot, just managed to finish inside evens,

and lost the event to Central Sussex; good luck to

them, we will try and get it back next year.

Fastest 25 miler of the year was again Robin, who managed to beat the hour on a couple of occasions. Next was Vet Maurice Wyatt, with a personal best of 1-2-11, then Richard Smith in one of his rare appearances in a time trial. Next was Alan Limbrey, then Alan Goodson. I think probably the best time trial performance in the club was that of Alan Limbrey in the SCCU 12, with 236 miles, which was a personal best, after not having ridden a 12 for something like 20 years. This also won him the SCA and club 12.

On the road race front we have had to rely mainly on the schoolboys, with an occasional excursion from the juniors. Fride of place again goes to Richard, with seven firsts, two seconds and one DNF from 10 starts. Alan Goodson also was placed in several events, in fact being placed second in the one event Richard did not finish. The Leigh brothers completed our representation, Colin and Owen, in his 3rd season at 14, both producing several good rides. Our senior representation being limited to myself holding up the finishing list in the Lewes events, and DNF in the SCCU event.

It occurs to me that if the petrol situation continues other commissaires will have to follow my example and commissaire from the back of the bunch on a bike:

Richard and Alan represented the Division in the National Schoolboys Road Race at Hull. Richard, unfortunately, was involved in a stack up in the Club track championships just before and did not compete. The event was somewhat of a shambles, the circuit being like a cart track and with a dog bringing down half the bunch a good time was had by all. Alan finished eigth after leading with about 400 yards to go.

Track racing, apart from Leicester, our efforts have been concentrated at Freston Fark, Colin Wood being our most successful rider, narrowly being beaten by George Mathews for the SCRL championships, newcomer John Oakes, with Alan Limbrey and Alan Fackett also being prominent. Alan Fackett's consistent riding in handicap events after a 21-year lay-off being somewhat of a suprise to us all.

Richard had three lsts and two 2nds from four rides, Alan managed a 2nd in a points race, Colin having to be content with Prime wins. It was good to see Sussex riders attacking at the front of a bunch of the best Juniors in the country.

That brings up to the commencement of the Cyclo-cross season. First event was the Old Ports at Shirley Hills, with the Leigh trio in the placings: Colin 3rd and Owen 6th in the Schoolboys' and Martin 3rd in the Junior events. Next came the East Surrey v. Harriers and out of the 112 starters, Martin and Colin Tood were 16th and 17th, Alan Goodson, Colin and Owen Leigh with Alan Limbrey among the finishers. The De Laune event on 4th October saw Richard Smith get his long legs mixed up in his bike and Colin Wood descending the steepest hill on his right ear. Martin was 3rd in the Junior event and Colin 3rd in the Schoolboys. The Tooting saw Colin again 3rd and the last one to date being the Festival event with Martin 1st in the Junior and Colin 2nd with Owen 4th in the Schoolboys.

I would like to stress the good Tony Yorke has done for our boys, so if you want your lads to be as fast send them along to the gym at Lancing on Thursday evenings.

Much hard work by Robin achieved a full start card in our '25'. A sterling ride by Mick Ballard on a cold hard morning proved that its the competition not the course that makes the event. With increasing traffic and further restrictions such as traffic lights, it may be that a return to more rural courses all over the country will be the order of things. It will be interesting to see how many 52 minute rides there are in genuinely unpaced events.

Our club runs tend to die out during the summer owing to the limited number of members not engaged in one form of racing or another. The end of the racing season saw a return to regular runs, the average turnout being about a dozen.

The reduction in Sunday traffic has brought a little more pleasure to riding and even moderate safety on main roads, and it was nice to see at least two other ESCA clubs out and about in the lanes. The 'white' Sunday saw a few adventures in the snow, one of them resulting in Colin Leigh riding home very gently on a cracked front rim.

Adrian is now in his 3rd season with Central. A back injury in 1973 may have curtailed some high placings in ESCA events.

Despite considerable apprehension, I was able to solicit the following from him which I feel indicates a far better performer than he is given credit for.

To give the reader a more personal view, Adrian's cycling career to date is in the first person.

I started cycling in 1956, joining Crawley C.C. in 1959. Mounted on a second-hand Rotrax my first race was a 25 on Gl6 (Horsham-Washington) returning a 1-12-21.

In 1960 I rode a 50 in 2-23-0, and my first 100 in 5-25-24 in a gale and pouring rain. Going abroad for the first time-to Austria with Ron Ford, Graham Seymour and Pete Vickery.

The SCCU 12 in 1961 (213m.) put me off 12's for another 7 years. Following that dreaded 12 I went to

Norway with Ron Ford and John Webb.

Improved somewhat in 1962: 25 in 1-4 and a 2-10 50; also 4-43 100. Toured in France with Ron Ford, Colin Scott and Bern Wright. Returned there and to Spain in 1963 with Ron Ford. In 1964 improved my 100 to 4-29-14 and 25 in 1-2-28, winning 1st Handicap again.

1st Eastbourne Spring Handicap in 1965, also won the Basildon R.R., making me 2nd cat., but was soon 3rd cat. again. In May 1966 broke collar bone but 2 months later

improved 50 to 2-5-55.

In 1968 I was persuaded to ride a 12 again with 7 other Crawley Wheelers and did 239 miles. Martin Roach did 277 miles. 1969 saw improvements of 23-59, 1-0-25, 2-3-43, 4-22-54 and 244 miles, BAR cert of 22.470 mph. Improved R.R. in 1970 with 4th in Redmon R.R. and 6th in the Division Championship.

Gained 2nd cat. with a win in the Lewes Criterium and 3rd in SCCU 3/J R.R. in 1971. Beat the hour, 59-45. Third place in SCCU BAR, my 12 of 236 miles won me the Sussex CA Championship. I gained 1st cat. licence in 1972 with three 2nds, 3rd in Div. Champs. Rode Tour of Ireland with Paul Lipscombe and George Matthews.

1973 was a vintage one for crashes, but probably my best ride was with Paul Lipscombe in the Sussex CA 2-up

#### SOUTHBOROUGH AND DISTRICT WHEELERS

Have you noticed a decline in the number of people who say "Cycling - you must be mad," and a rise in the enquiry "You don't know where I could get a second-hand bike, do you?" To which I reply, "No, but I can introduce you to a dozen people who have asked me the same question." It seems strange that the capriciousness of oil sheikhs has earned cyclists a new respectability and while I can't go along with that euphoric faction who see this as a chance to put the clock back 20-plus tears with multitudinous club-runs and abundant teaplaces, the energy crisis might lift cycling from it's present malaise of circuit potters, drag-strip bashing and precious little else (except down this enlightened part of the world, that is).

The ESCA 25 saw us in with a team for a change, Bob clocked a 4-49 and Arthur Smith was 5 mins slower, but Crow messed things up by fracturing a crank and then puncturing, however he did reap a spin-off benefit by chatting up Jenny Boore when returning to the finish. The event takes one back to '58 when the BAR was decided on the final race. The time which looked like ESCAs first Vet BAR was toppled by one whose mid-season injuries could have put him right out of the BAR. My congratulations to Faul and condolences

to Ron.

The anti-gravity season had good support from Southborough. Bob Liddiard got the club championship from Geoff W. and Crow, then in the afternoon the Withers bros. and Phil Boddy took the team in the KCA climb. Bob and Grow got the Association team award with Crow getting 4 secs better than the new champ for 3rd place and Bob 4th. The number of spectatots at these events is quite surprising; I supposed that with the abolition of public flogging and that T.V. wrestling is all rigged, hill-climbs are the next best thing. Six Southboroughs in both the Catford and Bec in which Geoff and Male were our best, but not a smell of team placings. Crow's 2-24 was a personal best up the Catford after 21 years.
