#### EAST SUSSEX CYCLING ASSOCIATION - General & Racing Secretary's Report (1999)

I will start with the General Secretary's report.

- ▶ 1999 saw an addition to the Association's numbers by one club V.T.T.A. Surrey/Sussex.
- The 1998 Annual Lunch and Prize Presentation was held at a new venue, The Roebuck, Laughton, the move from Framfield being necessitated by the lack of affordable or willing outside caterers. Seventy five people attended including the majority of the award winners. This was pleasing because the event is about them. The 1999 awards lunch will be at the same venue on Sunday, 9th January 2000 at £10.00 per person (only 50 pence up on last year).
- The management committee met twice during the year.
- A letter from the Sussex Cyclists' Association was received suggesting closer co-operation, and in October four members of this Association (M. Rabbetts, M. Burgess, K. Atkins and R. Blackmore) met an S.C.A. delegation at Sayers Common. The only tangible result of the discussion was the item regarding the conditions for our Association's B.A.R. competition for next season. On Sunday last (14/11/99) I attended the A.G.M. of the S.C.A. After some discussion that meeting decided that due to lack of response from clubs and the low attendance at the meeting, a line should be drawn under the matter. This was agreed.

Now the racing year.

- 1999 saw a drop of about eighty entries over 1998. The most noticeable of these were the hardriders down by thirteen; the two up t.t.t. down by forty six; the 100 down by sixteen (1998 had included the S.C.A. championship as well) and the end of season 25 down by sixteen.
- Eastbourne Rovers continued to dominate the team awards with various combinations of riders.
- The Points Award went to the President, Richard Sutton (V.C. Etoile) the first time I think this has happened and he missed being B.A.R. by only .041 mph.
- The Senior and Veteran's B.A.Rs. went to Dave Pollard (Lewes Wanderers).
- Good to see new names on the Ladies B.A.R. (Angela Nainby East Grinstead) and the Junior B.A.R. (Keith Newsam Eastbourne Rovers).
- I suppose the ride of the year in one of our events, although not by an Association rider, was in the 100, won by Nik Gardiner (Mid Oxon C.R.T.) In 3.49.40.
- The programme for twenty hundred is the same as in nineteen ninety nine but hopefully with the hardriders moving east to the Rushlake Green/Bodle Street/Ashburnham area. A course has been more or less agreed but details of a headquarters require confirmation.
- Those who read Cycling weekly and other bits and pieces will be aware of people asking/suggesting changes. If you want changes, between now and July twenty hundred is the period to ask for them. Should all our events be open? Should standard distances be scrapped? Should we make our courses more 'sporting courses' orientated? Do not leave it until after July as it will then be too late to put things in place for the handbook deadlines.
- My thanks to our dwindling number of timekeepers, we really do need some more; all the marshals who turn out on the bad days when some riders don't; Charles Robson for his course and computing skills without which my task would involve much more work.
- Talking of Charles, next Sunday sees the reliability trial again. This is an event which must take a lot of time and trouble but it is enjoyed by many. Thanks Charles.

Now all that remains is - here's to the new century. The old came in on some odd looking machines and goes out on some odd looking ones, but the clothing is lighter and brighter.

#### MILLENNIUM QUICKSTEP

What is stirring west of the Cuckmere? Well, for starters, a positive talk with the proprietor of In-Gear revealed that with a little help from a whole retinue of sponsors the "In-Gear racing Sportive" is due to make its impact on the Sussex scene during the year 2000. It appears that many of the team will come from the 'Looses', Central, Crawley and East Grinstead. This will be headed by a team manager for each discipline. Bikes, clothing, expenses, will be provided; a launch party will be held in Uckfield shortly when the riders will be presented in their new kit. Sole dominance in both road racing and time trialling is the In-Gear plan so watch out for the next bulletin.

G.S. Stella have lost a key player in their racing set-up due to a domestic upheaval. With no new signings this year, Dr. Mark is trawling the local scene.

The R.T.T.C. London South A.G.M. this year proved a little more lively than in previous years, in fact even the usually restrained audience was a little effusive than usual, clearly the grass roots are getting a little more 'twitchy' re. the reluctance of London South to be a little more expressive and decisive in their end of year get-together with the ruling body instead of taking a passive role as in the past.

#### WHEN IS A CLUB NOT A CLUB?

If you asked your average clubman for his or her definition of a cycling club, it would in simple terms be a collection of people interested in pursuing a sport under the auspices of freely elected management comprising of your friends. A cursory look at London South's flock of clubs under administration reveals a considerable number of 'one man bands' who I suspect contribute absolutely nothing to the running of cycling generally and I suspect purely pay their Association fees out of self interest, most certainly not to bring in new members or encompass the sport generally. Since they do not promote or perform any aspect of administration I find it hard to understand the reason for the existence. In this area alone there must be at least twenty clubs which in fairness should cease to trade. Alternatively if they are unable to show a number of interested riders the D.C. should politely withdraw their participation. Equally there is no need for Association clubs to affiliate since the existing members are already members of other clubs.

The S.C.A. has a new Chairman. Uncle Les has stepped down and Dr. Mark is his replacement in order to bring the S.C.A. under the final guidance of the G.A. Stella Dr. mark has his chief cohort, Andy Payne, doing the time trial secretary's little number and Andy's wife, Dee, is the treasurer. All it needs now is the Bike Store staff to wade in as co-sponsors and form a grand alliance titled "La Sportive Grand Bike Store V.C." Can the county sustain two competitive bike shops trade teams.

My deep throat contact, Chris martin, has agreed to geve me more updated information on the In-Gear scenario. It would not be proper for me at this stage to publish his comments at the S.C.A. Dave Bentall took second each time and young Charles Corrie showed very well. The year's last 10 on Tonbridge by-pass gave Jimmy George a convincing win by over a minute. This was his last Southborough event as he has now left to join Renners R.T. He rode for them in Belgium and won a time trial there in October.

The weather intefered with the club programme at the end of the year as it had at the beginning. One Saturday 10 was washed out altogether and rain and gales caused the Touring Competition to be cancelled although five brave souls reached the start only to agree with the decision.

John & Peter Watson went to France to take part in the Duo Normand which was as enjoyable as ever. Terry Collins and Geoff Abraham went to France to stay a few days during which they road a randonee event. Peter Fox made a rare excursion from his Norfolk home and joined John Watson and a friend to ride the whole Southdowns Way - west to east. Peter Crofts is in the Phillippines leading the first C.T.C. party to visit there.

Nine club members attended the first Lunch of the social season - the Kent C.A. at Aylesford. The traditional warm up at the "Little Gem" beforehand saw some tarnished reputations when the Haymans turned up too late for a drink (they had attempted some rough stuff along the Medway towpath when the river was at high tide!) And the Dunfords left too early when they misjudged the sitdown time at the Lunch.

The mini road races which masquerade as Reliability Rides have begun. The 100k one in kent had fine weather and trouble free rides for most of those who started. Entries were well down on the three hundred plus of previous years. Southborough again provided most finishers in the four hour bracket with Martin Derham the first back - showing a fine turn of speed now the racing season is over.

#### EAST SUSSEX CYCLING ASSOCIATION - 1999 RELIABILITY TRIAL

There were 117 entries for this year's Reliability Trial, 10 less than last year, but the lack of an entry from 21st Century Airports accounted for the difference. In spite of the lower entry, 100 reported to the start - 7 more than last year - and 81 riders completed the course in the right time - 17 more than last year.

A big entry from Eastbourne (36) and Lewes (27) ensured a battle for the Shield, but the potential challenge from Crawley and Worthing did not materialise. There were 4 ladies, one on a mixed tandem.

Eastbourne retained the Rally Shield with 30 successful riders and Lewes were runners up again with 25 successful riders. 4 riders did not record a time and there were 5 that were too quick and 10 that were too slow. You will find the full result elsewhere in this issue of BONK.

The 81 successful qualifiers will each receive a Certificate, which will be presented at the E.S.C.A. Lunch & Prize Presentation at Laughton on Sunday 9th January 2000.

#### Organiser's Notes

The Sunday before the event I normally check the course, but this year I was saved the job by a keen clubmate in the shape of Max Norrell, who rode the course twice before the event.

After a cold and wet Saturday, the weather was considerably improved on the morning of the event. The cold NE wind had dropped and it was a little warmer. Although there was no bright sun there was also practically no rain.

Ken Griffiths has not been too well this year and so was not in his usual spot on the corner outside the King's Head at East Hoathly, but his place was taken by Den Funnell, who remembered crashing on that very corner of the A22 during a race and still with the scars to prove it. Ron and Marion Ball were looking after the parking up the lane and Chief Timekeeper and Co-Promoter, Esther Carpenter, was sending off the groups from 0830. There was no 2-50 group this year, so Esther and I were able to get away a bit sooner and make our way to Checkpoint 1 at Barcombe Cross, which was manned by Den Funnell and Deryk Greenway, assisted by Mick Kilby, who brought the check cards back to East Hoathly.

On towards Checkpoint 2, the lanes were a bit muddy after all the recent rain and quite a few riders suffered punctures on the way round. Checkpoint 2, usually manned by Mick Hayler (but today guest of honour at the Bognor Regis luncheon), saw Ron and Marion Ball in charge this year ably assisted by ESCA Chairman, Mick Rabbetts, who had ridden from his nearby country seat. Magnificent views from here but chilly for the checkers.

After a quick cup of coffee, we headed on passing various groups and singles on the way. There were riders stopped at the bridge in Jarvis Brook and we assumed a puncture, but Martin Yardley had had a spill and put a rather neat hole in the right-hand knee of his new tights. Checkpoint 3 opposite The Kicking Donkey was manned by Ray Prior and George Taylor. I had suggested to the checkers that a cardboard box was the easiest way of collecting the check cards and Ray had a box big enough to shelter a small rider! Undoubtedly the biggest box in the history of the ESCA Reliability Trial with the cards arranged neatly in separate piles according to colour. Yes it will entail a lot of time and effort, more even than being racing secretary for the Sussex Cyclists' Association. Oh yes, I forgot, you turned that nomination down. What was the motto you mentioned "Do It". That'll be the day.




