Champions night

The Road Time Trials Council and their devotees gathered at the Assembly Rooms in Derby for the annual tributes to champions of the 1992 season with Chris Boardman and his Lotus Sport bike as top of the bill, slightly overshadowing British Best All-Rounder and G.S.Strada clubmate Kevin Dawson.

Organiser Eric Mustill of East Liverpool Wheelers was at the helm for the 11th time at Derby and confirms he has agreed under pressure to do it all again next time which is a special occasion as it is the 50th celebration.

A total of 517 people sat down for the dinner and another 150 or so came in for the presentations and dancing.

There was an absence of cross toasting - a deliberate move as some of the unpalatable comments were a bit over the top in the past and in any case many of them could not be understood by the majority.

As the diners entered the Great Hall they were greeted by the awesome sight of the Lotus machine, suspended highly above the top table with a banner hailing Chris Boardman's Olympic gold success and all lit up under the glare of a powerful spotlight.

All around the hall were the impressive club banners produced by Keith and Brenda Robins of Beekay, recording past national B.A.R. team champions, men and women.

RTTC Chairman Graham Morris welcomed everyone and introduced the special guests on the top table, including

Will Townsend, Eileen Sheridan, Andy Sutcliffe, Editor of Cycling Weekly, Robert Geering, of the RTTC printers and Jim and Dorothy Ogden, Altrincham Ravens.

The first presentation was to Dudley Roberts, 16 years secretary of the RTTC who earned glowing praise from the Chairman for his sterling work. Dudley was presented with a radio alarm clock - presumably set to go off at 6.01 hours!

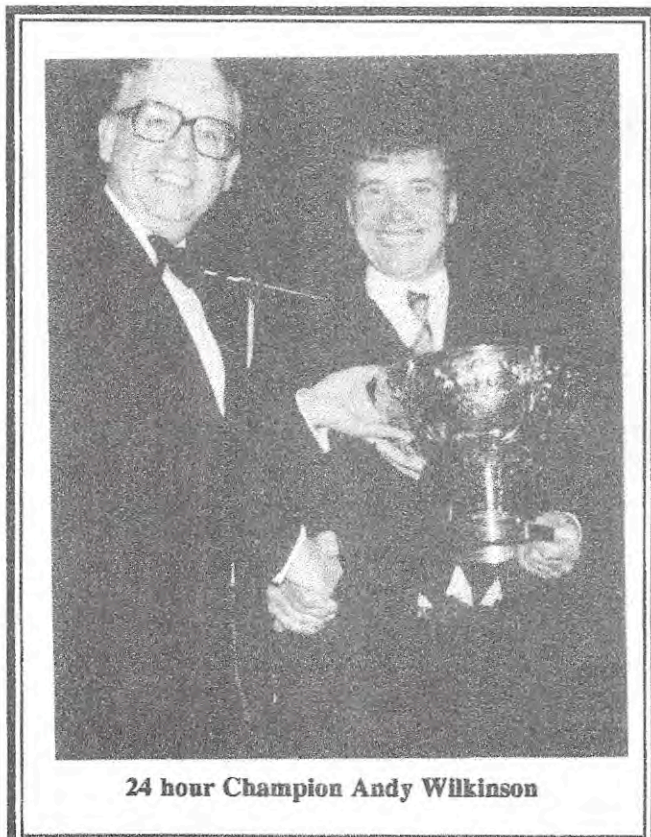

They took the National 25, 50 and 100 teams and the BBAR team, Hounslow and District Wheelers lined up holding boards spelling out the name of the club each time their members appeared, including the mens' National 100 miles and 12 hours teams and runners up in the BBAR team championship.

Clarence Wheelers were the mens' BBAR team winners with Ray Hughes leading Ben Edwards and Stewart House.

Sue Wright, Chelmer C.C., took the womens' BBAR title which included the National 100, saying on stage "It's great to be back", including in her speech of thanks a mention for husband Mick Gray of Crest C.C. who was second in the 24 hour championship.

Kevin Dawson of C.S.Strada was a worthy British Best All-Rounder, starting his speech with "this is much harder than winning the BBAR!" His tributes included "Couldn't wish for a better family" with a sincere mention of his mates in the Askern C.C. who helped with training. Kevin ended with a very astute statement, which went after listing all his likely contenders in 1993 "There can only be one winner... see you at Derby next year!"

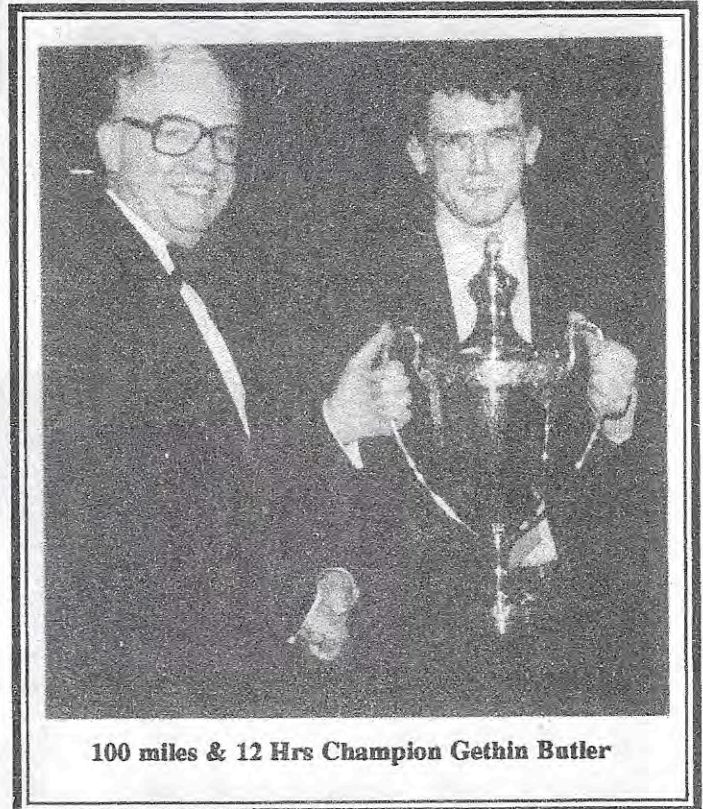

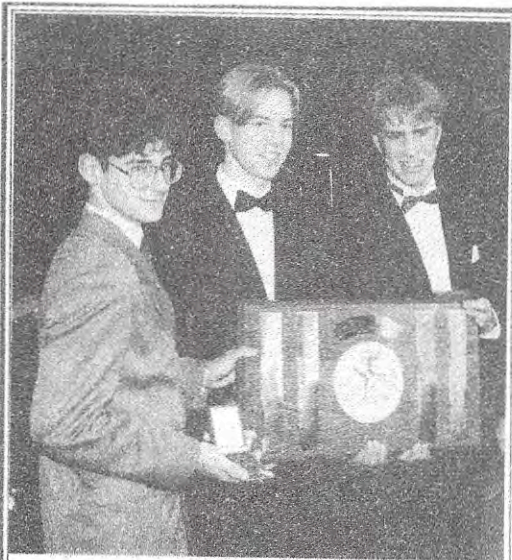

As usual with "BEJAOSS" promotions, and this event was to prove no exception, the entries for the event trickled in slowly to start with, but became a "flood" by the finish for this charity event for C.A.D.D.. How did the Bejaoss Wheelers achieve this, when just only three days before the closing date for the event, only 20 entries had been received.

That number of course, just wasn't good enough for the hierarchy of the Bejaoss Inner Sanctarium, especially when compared to the multitudes competing in the Bejaoss Wheelers R.A.M.K. promotion (Race Across Milton Keynes) in September 1992! So the Bejaoss Wheelers Members resorted to some of their "arm pulling" tactics and manoeuvres learnt with Randy-Wolf Findus during the Icelandic Cod War!

With this, the numbers soared, doubling on the official closing date to 40, and doubling further again to 94, when it finally closed two days before the event! It was any Organisers nightmare, especially when a section of the course was suddenly excavated by local council workmen in a last minute desperate bid, to scupper the smooth running of the Bejaoss Organisation, and to find the possible remains of Lord Lucan(!), the Bejaoss Wheelers Vice President, whose current address is in Ruanda, of all places!!

When the start sheet, for this Bejaoss Charity event finally went to press, there were some raised eye brows in the bicycle wheeling fraternity! With the likes of Bill Moore, Andy Hardy, Shay Giles, Nick Gardiner, Les Pick, Robert Barker starting on the '9' and Paul Panagi, Andy Barrett, Mick St Leger, Dave Hitchens, Malcolm Marsh, Karlo DePorter on the "4" numbers, what was the rest of the field of competitors capable of achieving!!

The real fast men in this special event on the '0's and '5's had bribed the Organiser, thus increasing the size of the cheque to go to C.A.D.D. There was Eddie Toal of the Bedfordshire R.C.C., the former Republic of Air Milk Drinking Champion, starting on number 20, who had bought his number, and still hasn't returned it.

Other '0' marked riders were Malcolm Ross on number 30, the man who did three 10's a week in 1992, as preparation for the National 24 and the Mersey Roads '24'. Nigel Hall who has just moved into the South East Midlands District of the R.T.T.C., specially to ride the three Bejaoss Wheelers 'Open' events a year!

On number 50, John 'Jugs' Pick was rumoured to have caught his son, Les, for a minute, after only 2 1/2 miles. John normally goes well during the winter months, but this performance surprised everybody. Controversy continued further, when his number was later found sellotaped to the rear of a 2.8 Ford Granada!!

Number 60 was bought eagerly by Richard Boon, for the charity C.A.D.D. This scratch rider, scratched at the last moment, and he is itching to do it again next year!

Tim Dolphin on 70, who normally rides the longer events (or is it swim!) such as the '12's and '24's, wanted to go up one and ride a '25' for Christmas, but was glad it was an '18' instead!

On the '5's, Dave '000' Smith, normally on an '0' number in the 'Bejaoss' events, was relegated to a '5' number on account of his stylish and sedate performances at this time of the year, due the increased number of miles ridden a week for the G.P.O., whilst delivering Bejaoss Wheelers Christmas Mail and presents (Lymeswold Cheese) Dave's training is currently 893 furlongs.

At number 25 was Tony Farnborough, who managed this time to turn up on time, due to

an early Christmas present, an alarm clock, radio, telephone, television, teasmade, answering machine, and burglar alarm, which makes him technically qualified to fly Jumbos!

On number 45 was 'Big Ben' Justin, who decided to ride this event instead of accepting the invitation to join the West Indies, on their tour of Australia!

At the start, it was bitterly cold, but dry, as the first 20 riders, all from the Bedfordshire R.C.C., set off to Ivy Mitton cry of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1, GO. They all wanted early starts because of a Christmas lunch at midday. There were plenty of mountain bikers, and a fairy and boxer were amongst them.

The first rider home, was to set a course record. This was Phil Moore of the Bedfordshire R.C.C. in a time of 54 minutes, 8 seconds, but this was broken 17 minutes later by Tony Parks, North Bucks R.C. with a 49.47. Then Robert Barker, 45 Road Club brought it down to a 48.42. Again this course record did not stand for long, when Malcolm Marsh Icknield R.C., European Veteran Triathlon Champion stormed past the finish timekeeper with a 48.28. Only for it to be broken by his team mate Les Pick, Icknield R.C., in a time of 43.39. The sixth breaking of the course record, would probably have been Nick Gardiner, but due to flu was unable to participate, so it went to Mick St Leger, shaving just 4 seconds off Les Picks time with a 43.35.

Other riders stormed round this Sporting Course which all the riders appeared to enjoy, Shay Giles, Mark Holden and Nigel Hall, but they were unable to get near the top two.

So it was left to Bill Moore, Leo Road Club to see if the Course Record could be broken for a seventh time. News came in that Bill hadn't stopped at the sit down feed at 10 miles at Emberton, near Olney (Bucks), and so obviously he was taking it seriously. At approximately 5 miles to go Malcolm Green from the North Road Cycling Club, timed Bill through at over a minute up on Mick St Leger and Les Pick. Bill stormed down the A422, to the finish at Stagsden, at an average speed of 30 m.p.h., to meet time keeper Frank Allcorn, North Bucks R.C., in just 42 minutes and 4 seconds, breaking 'Comp Record' for 18.213 miles.

As Bill said afterwards in conversation to act Time Trial Weekly Reporters Fall Sherbert and Fell Leggitt, as everybody awaited Franks final calculations on his abacus.

"Thank heavens that's over! Well I did finish between first and last so that's a start isn't it!"

"Bill, I noticed you said 'start' and not finish, you're obviously getting ready for 1993!"

"That's right Fell. With the new European free market Bejaoss say that they will be running a '50' in 1993, through the Channel Tunnel. What the gendarmes will make of this lot, heaven knows. As to getting ready for 1993, I am riding my bike once a month as it is."

"Well what did you think of this NC7/18 course?"

"Well Fall, those downhill stretches were really tough, several times I had to get off and walk."

Other notable tides were Jason Peppiatt and Wayne Maguire on their tandem for North Bucks, R.C., did a 45-56. The fastest lady was Liz Clayton, Bedfordshire R.C.C. with a 60.22.

Fastest M.T.B. was Ian Markham, who managed a 54.48, second was Greg Ashley, with a 57.53.

The fancy dress prize was hotly contested, between a fairy and a boxer. The boxer

known in these parts as the 'Beast', with leaden weights in his boxing gloves, as he managed to steer his machine round the course, came off worse. The fairy was untouched, but the beast came back with two black eyes with a sorry tale to tell. We won't embarrass the fairy, Paul Chennell or the 'Beast', Duncan White by naming them.

Fastest fixed wheel, was Tony Farnborough North Bucks R.C., who twiddled his way to 55 minutes and 5 seconds.

The first trike was a usual on the N Course, Cliff Tremaine, who despite being over 90 (rumour) did a 57.25.

Several people rode their first time trial because of the nature of the event. This category was won by Martin Le Voi in 63 minutes, 50 seconds.

Fastest youngster was Andy Evans from Icknield R.C. returning with a 57.19.

The fastest saddle bag belonged to Ray Crane Bedfordshire R.C.C. in a 66.49.

The most 'Bejaoss' rider award, for riding a bike with boxing gloves on, was Duncan 'The Beast' White of the A.5. Rangers Cycling Club.

The purpose of this 'Bejaoss' insanity was to raise money for the Campaign Against Drink and Driving (C.A.D.D.). This was the real winner on the day with £562 going to this worthy charity.

Bejaoss Wheelers Insanity continues on the same course, the NC7/18, on the 14th February 1993, in the Bejaoss Wheelers Valentines Day Massacre 2 Up Time Trial. See either the 1992 or 1993 R.T.T.C. Handbooks.

Despite being billed as a "Christmas 10", this Chesterfield Spire event is rapidly becoming the most fiercely contested "10" mile time trial on the calendar.

Indeed, the quality of the full field the profusion of disc wheels, tri-bars and such like, and the final result would suggest that this is a time trial being held in the middle of the summer, not two weeks before Christmas when, as tradition dictates, most club folk do nothing more strenuous than a hostel weekend or a ride to their local.

Seeing the gusto with which most (if not all) competitors set about riding the event, your scrivener was left wondering whether they hadn't had enough of 1992 or couldn't wait to get going for 1993.

It was, however, comforting to see a few "crack" riders who are obviously enjoying their winter in a more traditional manner, and as such they occupied somewhat modest positions in the final result. Most notable of these being John Charlesworth (Ace RT), Steve Calland (Stars and Stripes) and Chris Myhill (Dinnington RC Ideal) - a 19 minute man, who finished the wrong side of 23 minutes for "longer than I care to remember!". The event was hardly under way, when it became evident that this was to be one of the fastest close season "10" ever, as off number 20 Robbie Krygsman (Goole Vermuyden) stormed over the line in 22.02. A couple more 22-minute rides were posted before Laurie Holmes (Lead St. Christophers CCC) posted the first 21, with 21.44; a time which would have not been out of place at the top of the final result, had not so many of the other competitors toiled on their turbo trainers.

Ten minutes later, Les Pick (Icknield) failed by just 4 seconds to dislodge Holmes. Pick is a man who has still to realise his potential, despite a few years racing. Maybe this ride signals an assault upon the top echelons of the sport. It was left to Julian Ramsbottom (Dinnington

RC - Ideal) to dip under Holmes' time with 21.35, and with still half of the field to come a good race was in prospect.

Maybe Andy Sharpe (Bio RT - Argos) found the long journey from Gloucester a bit much: his 22.20 wouldn't make the top ten. But Jack Russell did, be slotted into the results with a fine 22.11, and he was to claim a few notable scalps into the bargain.

The arrival of Bill Moore (Leo RC - Shorter Rochford), however, put all of the previous rides in the shade.

Scorching across the line in a manner similar to his speeding team mate, Stuart Dangerfield, Moores time of 20.56 produced gasps from the now full headquarters.

Was Dominic Sweeney's record to be beaten, or was this to be Moores day? Moores sound 39 second margin over the likes of Ramsbottom seemed to suggest the latter. Indeed Bill Moore is one of those riders that on their day, are seemingly capable of anything - but unlike Boardman and Dangerfield he lacks consistency, and so all too often (to his liking) he is equally capable of disappointing.

Twenty minutes later, off number 100, Nick Gardiner (Oxford Polytechnic CC) nibbled at Moores time with 21.11 and was left to wonder "what if I'd used a disc wheel" and "what if I'd used my number 1 bike?"

Indeed Gardiners last 3 seasons have been a succession of "what ifs". After recording a 1-45 for a "50" during 1991, Nick was to see his BBAR aspirations evaporate when he contracted glandular fever for the third time in as many years. Having located the problem as being his tonsils, Nick set about 1992 with short distance aspirations, resulting in a 19.14 "10" and 48.51 for "25".

For 1993 he has his sights set on an 18 minute "10" and the BBAR - look out Dawson and Butler! After many years of trying this prodigious talent looks set to achieving the acclaim he deserves.

With Ian Cammish not putting in an appearance, there was just Chris Allcock (Delta RT - Dynatech) left to come; but not before Stewart House (Clarence Wheelers) joined the "21 Club" with 21.58. Allcock won this event in 1991 but this year the competition proved to be too hot, and he was left to salvage fourth position with 21.38.

So an afternoons' fine competition came to an end with just the apres race analysis to be chewed over, and with many of the riders having not seen each other since the summer, lots of tales were left to be told.

As a final word; talking to the riders, many seemed to agree that the resurfacing of substantial sections of the course was partly responsible for the fast times, and judging by todays performances, the 010/2 could very well be the venue for many 18-minute 10's come the warmer weather - roll on summer.

The Roger Farley Memorial 10 mile time trial on New Years Day had attracted a field of 53 but there were some non starters notably Martin Pyne, Polytechnic CC and Mick St leger, Cwmcarn Paragon.

Last years winner Geoff Frost, Loughborough Students, still suffering the effects of a throat infection, could only manage 3rd place with his 23.28 ride leaving the battle for top placing to Gary Empson, Aero BC, and Jes King Haverhill Wheelers with King running out the winner by 20 seconds to finish in 22.48 to Empson's 23.08. Fifth placed Geoff Bateman, C.C. Breckland, 24.08, led clubmates Mick Gambling, who was fastest vet on standard, 24.51, and Reuben Howden, 26.40, to the Club's first team win of '93.

VC Slough targets 1993 team honours

VELO CLUB SLOUGH has strengthened its 1993 membership, and with comeback man Steve Hunt, an ex-GHS "10" champion reportedly going great guns their sights are firmly on national team honours.

Although short of numbers last year, the club still had an impressive victory strike-rate in 1992 with new veteran Dave Creese notching 18 of them in becoming the fastest-ever 40 year old 25-miler, and 19 year old Phil Silver notching 14 firsts, mixing time trials with road and track racing.

Another win came impressively when Steve Hunt, after an eight-year lay off, won the first event in which he competed this year, a 21 minute "10" to take the Icknield RC event.

He is keen to follow in the wheelmarks of former clubmates including Noel Lilley, Eddie Adkins, Martin Pyne, Roger Queen and John Woodburn.

Others swelling the ranks for 1993 include fast vet Dave Hitchens from Team Chiltern; former GHS "10" medallist Andy Russell; Peter Edwards from Welwyn Wheelers and Richard

Cosford, ex-45 Road Club, with a string of fast "10s" to his credit.

This looks like doubling this year's numbers, joining the core of the 1992 membership, which included Dave Smith; Bas Clarke; last year's club BAR Steve Seeby; Adrian Briers (who improved to a short 54 at 25 miles); Richard Palmer and New Zealander Mark Hoskin.

The 1993 team medals target stems from founder and club president John Webb's original philosophy of the importance of the traditional cycling club - with an emphasis on working together to try to win team awards, as a top priority. This is reflected in the red, white and blue sleeves of the VC Slough jerseys, traditional hallmark of clubs that have national team victories to their credit.

Of the 19 RTTC national championships and competition records to be won, or broken, by VC Slough riders in the past 16 years, 10 have been team awards - plus two on a tandem. John Webb got in the record book himself (with Roger Queen and John Burnham) when, in its second full season in 1978, VC Slough

gained the first of three consecutive team "30" national bests, each time with a different third counter. His squad system certainly paid off!

Dave Creese is the ideal rider to spearhead the VC Slough challenge. In addition to his 48-25 "25" he ended the season on a high, counting.

Ian Cammish, John Pritchard and Eddie Adkins among the "scalps" he took in a memorable season.

Many pundits believe Phil Silver, the former national schoolboy sprint and 1991 junior BAR champion, to have the greatest potential of Britain's next generation of young hopefuls.

With a stronger squad and having gained a year's experience, this could be a year to remember for the big lad from Hitchin.
